On the eve of his death, Louis Riel said about the Métis: "It is true that our Indian origin is humble, but it is indeed just that we honour our mothers as well as our fathers. Why should we be so preoccupied with what degree of mingling we have of European and Indian blood? No matter how little we have of one of the other, do not both gratitude and filial love require us to make a point of saying, 'We are Métis.'"

In British Columbia there is a tendency to think of the Métis as either recent prairie immigrants, not fully part of the BC Aboriginal Community, or as dis-organized and largely accidental descendants of the occasional First Nations-European liaison from the fur trade era. Our research has shown that the presence of Métis communities west of the Rockies is demonstrable, and further that these communities are both of British Columbia, rooted in relationships with British Columbian First Nations people, and linked to the wider Métis community of the parkland and prairies east of the Rockies.

In this presentation we introduce cousins and countrymen of Louis Riel, and describe how they fit into the Métis world that he died trying to defend.
