Program Notes:

Geistliches Lied, Op. 30

Brahms' Geistliches Lied or "Spiritual Song" was perhaps his first choral composition, written in 1856, when he was just 23 years old. Aligning with the stereotype of Brahms' music being structurally complex, this piece features not one, but two canons, pairing the sopranos and tenors, and the altos and basses, each at an interval of a 9th.

Adding a sense of gravitas to Flemming's text concerning Faith, Brahms marks the piece *Lento*; the vocal lines sound stretched, almost uncomfortably slow, creating a feeling of inevitability in their motion forward.

<u>Requiem</u>

Following the composition of *Requiem*, Toronto-based composer Eleanor Daley received the National Choral Award for Outstanding Choral Composition of the Year in 1994 by the Association of Canadian Choral Conductors. The Requiem was commissioned by Jake Nealey (Elmer Isler Singers), who at the time was caring for a terminally ill friend.

Daley's Requiem differs from the traditional Latin Requiem Mass for the Dead in that it is predominantly in English, and features texts from non-biblical sources, including humanist poetry.

Characteristic of Daley's writing, the music of the Requiem is intended, at all times, to serve the text; Daley's compositional choices (harmony, rhythm, meter, texture, and melodic contour) throughout are consistently aimed at amplifying the rhetoric.

The work as a whole is truly beautiful, not only to hear, but also to sing.
