어기영차 (Eogi young cha)

Eo-gi-young-cha is the Korean version of composer Hyowon Woo's 'Alleluia'. The piece is characterized by the repetition of the four syllables in the lyrics 'Eo-gi-young-cha' expressed with intense rhythms and accents. The piece borrows the chorus from the "sailor's song", a traditional Korean work song sung while fishing. The lyrics "Raise the sail" and "Row the oars" are sung by solo lines, and Eo-gi-young-cha is a form of call and response sung by a group of sailors to heighten the work spirit.

Rivers of Light

The northern lights have been the subject of myth and legend for millennia. In ancient times some even believed them to be dragons dancing across the sky. The aurora borealis are the subject of Ēriks Ešenvalds' Rivers of Light. Sámi folk songs are interwoven throughout the piece, enhancing the timeless quality of the phenomenon. Highly evocative and descriptive writings of Candace Savage, Kari Kaila, William Reed, and explorers Fridtjof Nansen and Charles Francis Hall captivate the imagination. And Ešenvalds' trademark rich and shimmering harmonies characterize the luminescent dance of the borealis.

Salve Regina

Salve Regina is one of the four Marian Antiphons recited or sung at different seasons within the Christian liturgical calendar. The original prayer and chant date from the 11th century.

Hail, holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, Hail our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, Poor banished children of Eve; To thee do we send up our sighs, Mourning and weeping in this valley of tears.

Turn then, most gracious advocate, Thine eyes of mercy toward us; And after this our exile, Show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

Leron, Leron Sinta

Leron, Leron Sinta (or "My Dear, Little Leron") is a popular Filipino folk song from the Tagalog region. It is traditionally a work song, representing those who are in the fields harvesting fruits, though the origin is unclear due to the lack of scholarly literature that examines Philippine folk music. Because of its catch tune, it is often presented as a children's song, though some parts of the text may have been meant for a more mature audience. Some sources also refer to it as a courtship song. Hyejung Jun serves as Assistant Professor of Choral Conducting at the University of British Columbia after completing her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. She earned her Master of Music degrees from Yonsei University in Korea and Emory University in the United States.

During her time in Cincinnati, Jun conducted and assisted the CCM Chamber Choir, the CCM Chorale and taught undergraduate conducting classes. She also was awarded the May Festival Conducting Fellowship for the 2018-2019 season under the mentorship of Robert Porco, Director of Choruses of the May Festival Chorus. Additionally, she has

served as Assistant Conductor of the Women's Chorus at Xavier University.

Jun has extensive experience as a singer, pianist, and conductor. Her performances have been recognized for their sensitivity and excellence. Prior to coming to the United States, she was the winner of the National Choral Conducting Competition in Seoul, South Korea, and after moving to the United States, she was a finalist in the Graduate Conducting Competition of the American Choral Directors Association.

Graeme Langager is Director of Choral Activities at the University of British Columbia School of Music. As is a passionate and dynamic conductor, Langager is sought-after as a clinician, adjudicator, educator and guest conductor. He has performed throughout Europe and across North America, appearing in such venues as St. Mark's in Venice, St. Peter's in the Vatican, St. Steven's in Vienna, Carnegie Hall in New York and in cathedrals and concert halls in Spain, Italy, France, Austria and the Czech Republic. Langager's choirs have also performed at numerous choral conferences, including: NCCO (National Collegiate Choral Organization), ACDA-AR (American Choral Directors Association Conference, Arkansas), IAJE (International Association of Jazz Educators), MENC/NAfME (National Association for Music Education), and the Montreux and North Sea Jazz Festivals. Langager served as the artistic director and conductor of the acclaimed Phoenix Chamber Choir in Vancouver from 2012-2018, during which the choir released 3 CDs, performed with the Vancouver

Symphony Orchestra, Andrea Bocelli, and was privileged to be invited to perform at Canada's Podium Conference in 2016 showcasing the best choirs in the country.

Langager was born into a musical family, singing and playing instruments from an early age. He received the doctoral degree in choral conducting from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and the master of music degree from California State University, Long Beach. Langager also holds a degree in Jazz Studies. He has taught for more than 20 years in universities and colleges in the United States and Canada, and is also active as a composer and arranger.
